### STATE PLAN BASICS

# State Plan Governing Authority and Purpose

Governor must submit a four year plan to Secretary of Labor to be eligible for core programs to receive allotments.

Two options for submitting a State plan:

- Unified Plan § 102
- Combined Plan § 103

State plans communicate the State's vision for workforce system and are used to align and integrate the system across federal programs.

# A State Plan Must Include Six Core Programs

- the Adult program (title I of WIOA)
- the Dislocated Worker program (title I)
- the Youth program (title I)
- the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act program (title II)
- the Wagner-Peyser Act program (Wagner-Peyser Act, as amended by title III)
- the Vocational Rehabilitation program (title I of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended by title IV)

# WIOA Combined Plans May Include:

- Career and technical education programs (Perkins)
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program (TANF)
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Work programs authorized under section 6(o) of the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008
- Trade Adjustment Assistance for Workers programs
- Jobs for Veterans State Grants Program (JVSG)

- Unemployment Insurance programs
- Senior Community Service Employment (SCSEP)
- Employment and training activities carried out by the Department of Housing and Urban Development
- Community Services Block Grant (CBSG)
- Reintegration of Ex-Offenders program (Re-Exo)

### State Plan Submission and Review Process

- Subject to public review and comment
- Submitted through the Governor's office
- Reviewed by interagency teams of core programs staff and, if applicable, partner programs staff
- Approved by the Secretaries of Education and Labor

### First WIOA State Plans

- Four-year plans were submitted in Spring 2016
- Approval process included all federal core programs and optional partner programs
- Plans were "conditionally approved" on July 1, 2016
- States submitted required revisions in October 2016
- Some States submitted "action plans" to address deficiencies that required more time to resolve

# Information Collection Request

- Allows federal government to collect information from States
- Outlines the required elements for Unified and Combined Plans and modifications
- Undergoes public comment period prior to release

# Strategic Planning Elements of a State Plan

### This section includes:

- Economic, Workforce, and Workforce Development Activities
- State Strategic Vision and Goals
- State Strategy

These analyses drive the required vision and goals for the State's workforce development system and alignment strategies for workforce development programs to support economic growth.

# Operational Planning Elements of a State Plan

#### This section includes:

- State Strategy Implementation
- State Operating Systems and Policies
- Assurances
- Program-Specific Requirements for the Core Programs
- Program-Specific Requirements for the Combined State Plan Partner Programs

# Creating High Quality Elements

# Use of factors that are encouraged in developing high quality plans:

- Incorporating WIOA's key principles and Departments' policy priorities
- Using labor market data and workforce information to ensure customers have high quality information available for their decision making
- Including robust analysis (workforce development, education, training activities)
- Considering how to accomplish program alignment and integration of services

# Collaborative Planning

### Keys to strong plans:

- Joint planning and coordination across core programs, required one-stop partners, and combined partners
- Agency review and feedback for each program
- Opportunity for public comment

### STATE PLAN MODIFICATIONS

### State Plan Modifications

- Each State is required to submit plan modifications in spring 2018
- A State may submit a modification at any time during the four-year period of the plan

# What Triggers a Modification?

- Changes in labor market and economic conditions
- Other factors affecting the implementation of the State plan
- Changes in policy that affect the statewide visions, strategies, goals, and priorities that the Plan is based on
- Changes in statewide vision, strategies, policies, levels of performance
- Funding allocation methodology
- Reorganizations

### **Modification Process**

- Subject to public review and comment
- Submitted through the Governor's office
- Reviewed by interagency teams of core programs staff and, if applicable, partner programs staff
- Approved by the Secretaries of Education and Labor

# Performance Requirements in the Modification

•States must include *proposed* levels of performance for PY 2018 and PY 2019 in their modification

# How to Request a Portal Account

- Go to RSA website <a href="https://rsa.ed.gov/">https://rsa.ed.gov/</a>
- Follow the five step process to request an account
- All State Directors should request and maintain an account
- State staff may request an account and DAEL will confirm the request with the State Director

# Using the Portal

- Material developed prior to the portal's availability can be copied into the appropriate sections of the portal.
- The portal will allow users to paste and save content into the appropriate section of a plan.
- Saving information into one section of a plan will not effect users working on other sections of the plan.

# Using the Portal

- Users will have access to the relevant sections of the plan.
  The program-specific elements within each plan can be completed by staff within the State independent of the other sections of the plan.
- For example, the Adult Education & Literacy Program's section of the State plan can be developed by the authorized staff in the State.

# Using the Portal

- Once the State is finished modifying its Unified or Combined State Plan, the State will be able to submit the entire plan to the Departments through the portal.
- Once submitted, the plan will be available to the Department of Labor, the Department of Education, and any other Federal agency that may be included in the Plan.
- The submission date and date the plan is received will be the same.

### Review

- The first WIOA State plans were submitted in spring 2016.
- Plans contain strategic and operational elements.
- All States are required to submit modifications in spring 2018.
- State plans are submitted via an online portal.
